



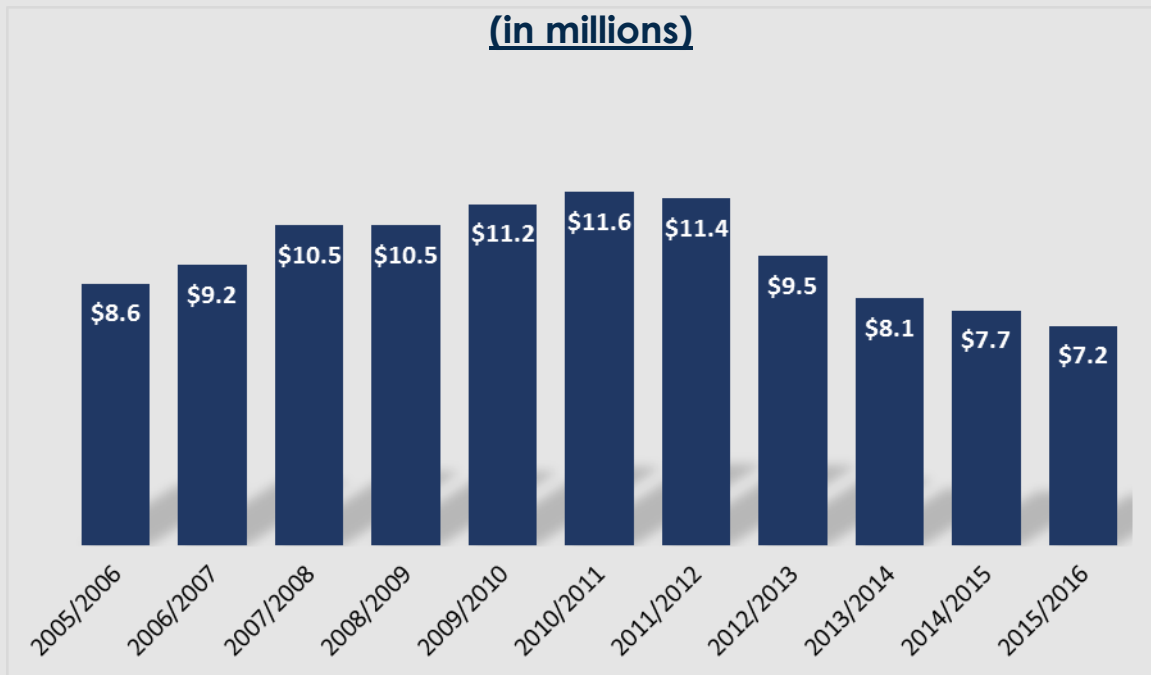

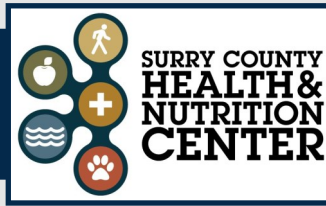


Surry County Health and Nutrition Center's Annual Operating Budget

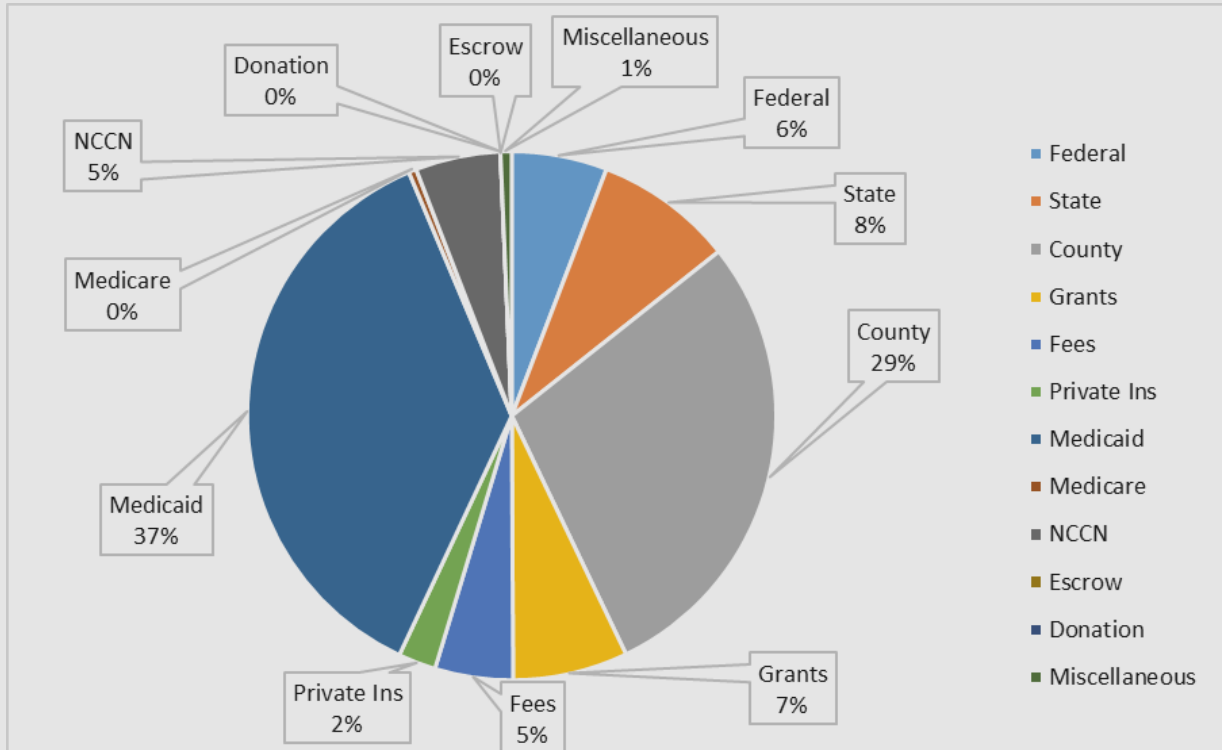

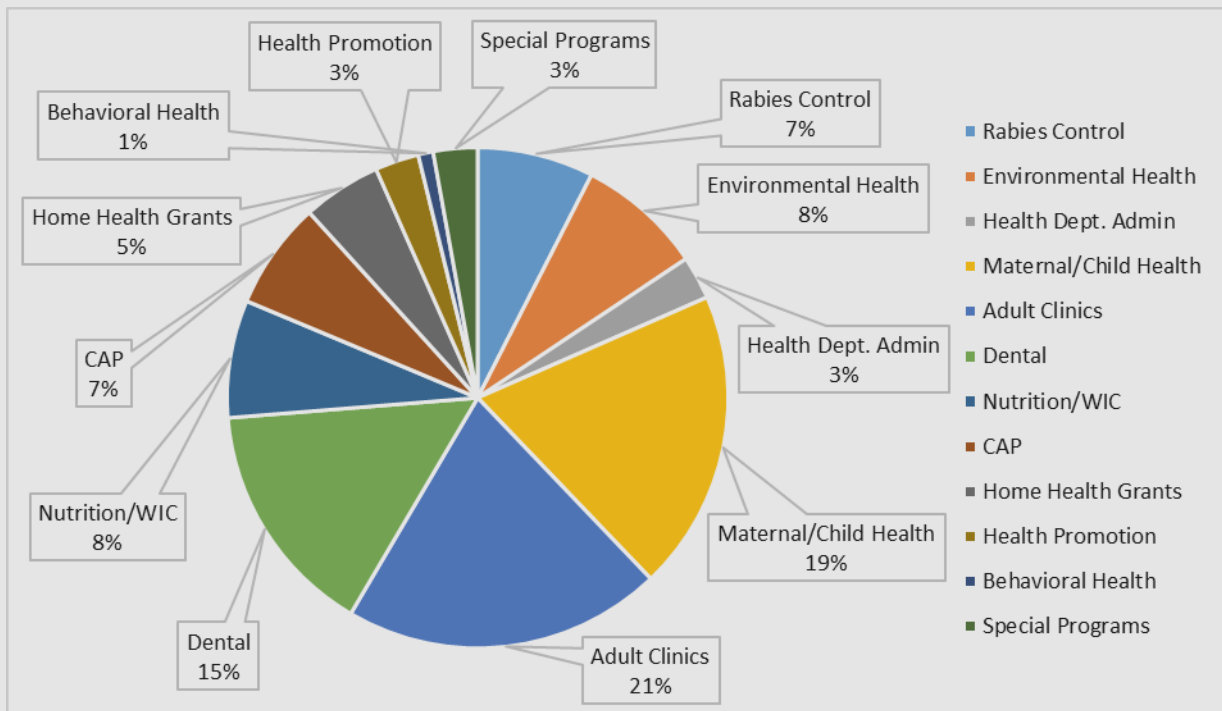
Surry County Health and Nutrition Center 2017 Goals and Objectives:

The Surry County Health and Nutrition Center was excited to begin offering PrEP in 2016. "PrEP" stands for Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis, and is a way for people who don't have HIV, but who are at very high risk of getting it, to prevent HIV infection by taking a pill every day. PrEP is a powerful HIV prevention tool and can be combined with condoms and other prevention methods to provide even greater protection than when used alone. When taken every day, PrEP has been shown to reduce the risk of HIV infection in people who are at high risk by more than 90%.

In combining efforts, our dental and child health programs have implemented 'Into the Mouth of Babes' (IMB) program in 2016. The IMB/Connecting the Docs program trains medical providers to deliver preventative oral health services to young children insured by NC Medicaid. Services are provided from the time of tooth eruption until age 3 1/2, and they include oral evaluation and risk assessment, parent/caregiver counseling, fluoride varnish application, and referral to a dental home. The goals for this collaboration include preventing and reducing early childhood tooth decay and increasing referral of high risk children to a dental home.

The Occupational and Environmental Epidemiology Branch of the NC Department of Health and Human Services implemented a recent change in services to build capacity for addressing mold related issues by now allowing local health departments to take citizen calls regarding mold and moisture.

Surry County's Environmental Health staff has been educated and trained to handle all citizen concerns and will be able to offer guidance on dampness, mold, indoor air quality, how mold grows, health effects, and offer cleanup recommendations.
